this book critically approaches contemporary meanings of materiality and discusses ways in which we understand experience and engage with objects through popular culture in our private social and professional lives appropriating arjun appadurai s famous phrase the social life of things with which he inspired scholars to take material culture more seriously and as a result treat it as an important and revealing area of cultural studies the book explores the relationship between material culture and popular practices and points to the impact they have exerted on our co existence with material worlds in the conditions of late modernity

taking an innovative approach to the study of religious literature and literary modernity this book examines an overlooked body of texts collections of hasidic hagiographic stories about pious leaders which were mass produced during the nineteenth century and makes a compelling argument for reading these works as a crucial part of modern jewish literature despite criticism from members of the jewish enlightenment who dismissed the leisure reading of these hasidic booklets as lowbrow the texts found a thriving audience in eastern european jewish society in a nuanced study chen mandel edrei challenges the conventional view of hasidic literature as inherently anti modern and demonstrates how these popular stories presented a unique alternative path for jewish modernity placing hasidic storytelling and publishing in sociopolitical context mandel edrei centers the reading and writing practices of the ordinary people who drove the success of the hagiographic genre particularly in galicia following the 1848 revolutions she analyzes how hasidic writers actively engaged with modern political philosophical and aesthetic ideas adapting them to their traditional way of life and reimagining concepts like individuality and communal identity deftly combining literary analysis and cultural history this book illuminates the interplay between religion mysticism and the emergence of mass print culture shedding new light on the history of hasidism jewish literature and modernity itself

new orleans is unique which is precisely why there are many crescent cities all over the world for almost 150 years writers artists cultural brokers and entrepreneurs have drawn on and simultaneously contributed to new orleans s fame and popularity by recreating the city in popular media from literature photographs and plays to movies television shows and theme parks

addressing students and fans of the city and of popular culture popular new orleans examines three pivotal moments in the history of new orleans in popular media the creation of the popular image of the crescent city during the late nineteenth century in the local color writings published in scribner s monthly century magazine the translation of this image into three dimensional immersive spaces during the twentieth century in disney s theme parks and resorts in california florida and japan and the radical transformation of this image following hurricane katrina in public performances such as mardi gras parades and operas covering visions of the crescent city from george w cable s old creole days stories 1873 1876 to disneyland s new orleans square 1966 to rosalyn story s opera wading home 2015 popular new orleans traces how popular images of new orleans have changed from exceptional to exemplary

the kurds once marginal in the study of the middle east and secondary in its international relations have moved to centre stage in recent years the contributors to the kurdish question revisited offer insights into how this once seemingly intractable immutable phenomenon is being transformed amid the new political realities of the middle east

this original collection of articles derived in part from the papers presented at the twenty sixth biennial conference of the classical association of south africa held at durban and pietermaritzburg 5 7 july 2005 explores a wide range of receptions of classical ideas in the fiction drama poetry history opera and popular culture of a number of countries from south africa to cuba there is a strong emphasis on the use of greek and roman tragedy especially aeschylus seven against thebes the electra plays of sophocles and euripides various reworkings of the figures of antigone and medea and the dramatic style of seneca but the compendium also includes chapters on platonism horatian satire mythology roman civilization roman historiography and greek erotic spells chronologically the scope of reception extends from the contemporary the problem of hiv aids in south africa to the twentieth century soyinka walcott forster seth campbell and the renaissance daniel heinsius the book illustrates the depth diversity and complexity of the interconnections between the classical past and the present it provides a refreshingly different perspective on a vitally important and vibrant field of research

in this new scholarly text an ambitious study of contemporary poetics joe w moffett deciphers the twentieth century long poem searching for a better understanding of why long poem writers are preoccupied with a search for origins moffett focuses on issues like postcolonialism nation modernism and postmodernism he conceptualizes his theories by using what he calls originary moments historical periods or specific events from which a poet contends our culture descends these moments enlighten and inspire the modern poet to use origin or source as a way to examine present culture and social conditions the poems also encourage modern readers to question revise and repudiate moffett organizes his argument by arranging specific examples into three categories of originary moments sumerian homeric and anglo saxon according to moffett the long poem is appealing because it lacks strict conventions that govern other genres using a wide variety of poems to support his arguments moffett asks many stimulating questions and also provides provocative answers questions of when and where it all began have been off the critical agenda for some time now embargoed by poststructuralism undeterred joe moffett boldly revisits the search for cultural origins which preoccupied major poets throughout the twentieth century capacious in his scope eclectic in his choices moffett rounds up unusual subjects including long poems by armand schwerner derek walcott geoffrey hill and

judith grahn with excursions into charles olson seamus heaney and others nowhere will you find clearer more intelligent or better informed readings of these poems than moffett s
